COURSE DESCRIPTION

The Course introduces the European peace and security policy and the complex decision-making and institutionalization policies that define it. It examines the historical, institutional, theoretical, and international dimensions of the European security and defence integration and the challenges and opportunities faced by the EU as it enhances its international security role. After a brief overview of key historical developments since the end of WW2, we will discuss the main theoretical approaches dealing with European security. The course will then focus on specific issues and policy domains pertaining to European peace and security policy. It first takes a closer look on governing actors within the EU as well as inter-organizational cooperation within the field (EU-NATO) cooperation. It then analyses different policy domains including the EU's Common Foreign and Security Policy (CFSP) and its dedicated Common Security and Defence Policy (CSDP), internal security and migration security. We will also look at case studies of several CSDP missions and operations and include group briefings on the missions in Somalia, Bosnia and Herzegovina, and Mali. The final part of the course takes a closer look at current dynamics in European foreign policy and the EU's role in global politics.

The course offers students empirical knowledge about various dimensions of European peace and security, analytical skills to better understand European security and shed light on its developments from various theoretical perspectives and encourages students to engage with current political debates related to the EU and more generally to security governance beyond the nation-state, its organization, problem-solving capacity and legitimacy.

COURSE OBJECTIVES AND LEARNING OUTCOMES

The most important goal of the course is to impart to students a solid understanding of theories and empirical evidence regarding European peace and security policy.

Additionally, upon completion of this course, students should also be able to:

- Define and identify the characteristics of European foreign policy;
- Gain familiarity with the major theories of European peace and security policy;
- Compare and question different theoretical and empirical approaches to European foreign policy;
- Gain understanding with concepts of EU foreign policy and contemporary debates on Common Security and Defense Policy (CSDP);
- Explain historical cases in light of the theories discussed in class;
- Combine theoretical perspectives with empirical examples;
- Improve their analytical skills in dealing with academic texts.

This includes in particular that you are able to:

- Examine and decide to what extent one of the theoretical perspectives can explain the emergence, development and/or effects of selected case(s);
- Select case(s) to investigate with the resources available to you (case selection);
- Formulate a research question for the investigation of selected case(s), which you can answer within the framework of the resources available to you (research question);
- Obtain and process literature serving to answer the research question and write down your research results and argumentation in a structured and focused manner in the form of a seminar paper.

At the end of the seminar, you should be able to, or have improved your ability to,

- Describe important characteristics, processes and possible actions of EU foreign policy;
- Describe central issues and challenges in the theory and practice of EU foreign policy;
- Collect, process, systematize and communicate existing knowledge on a specific research question in a cooperative and individual manner.

REQUIREMENTS

Language requirements:

The language of instruction is English.

Active and regular participation:

This course is designed for students in the political science bachelor's programs who have already taken courses in International Relations and are interested in European peace and security policy. For each week, there are 1-2 texts listed as required reading and a selection of further reading. The required reading serves as preparation for the respective sessions and must be read by all participants. For course credits, reading of the core literature and oral participation in discussions and group work are expected.

As preparation for the essay, students should give a short **presentation** (max. 10 minutes) for one topic listed in this syllabus. Please prepare a 1–2-page thesis paper to be uploaded to the appropriate Moodle folder by Tuesday prior to the session. Presentations deal with the additional literature listed below.

Bibliography and annotation:

Students will prepare a bibliography comprising 20 academic texts, 5 of which must be annotated, that are relevant for their research question. Make sure that you include monographs, chapters in edited volumes and articles in academic journals. Please upload your bibliography on Moodle **until 10.01.25**.

Essay:

As final examination assignment, you will work on an **essay** that provides a (partial) answer to a research question. The main part of the paper should deal with the analysis or the answer to the research question and not with the detailed description of the topic or the general historical background of a case. The research question addressed in the paper must be stated precisely in the introduction. The reference to the general context (topic of the seminar) should not be missing in term papers. With a term paper you should show that you are able to work independently on a topic using scientific working techniques and methods; this includes an independent literature search. You should strive to include articles from academic journals, in addition to the "easy" to find monographs and internet sources. Note also that the state of research in the field of EU peace and security policy is not limited to German-language literature. A large part of the central contributions has been and will be published in English.

Requirements: Essay of 4.500 – 5.000 words (approx. 13-15 pages). Ideally, your essay topic will be related to the topic of your presentation. The essay can be written either in English or German (though English is preferred) and is **due on March 15, 2025**.

Please upload your essay as a pdf file (file name: EUPASP2024_NameFirstName) in the designated Moodle folder. A print version is not required.

This is intended to provide an alternative to (often tedious) session routines, which consist of a long presentation and leave (too) little room for discussion. **Questions** about preparation and literature can be asked at any time in the Moodle forum and will be answered either there or in the next session. All course materials will be made available in the Moodle course.
